

Armand L Santarelli, Sr.

Armand Santarelli, Sr. 85, of Absecon passed away peacefully on April 14, 2014. He was born in 1929 in Philadelphia, and had suffered from Alzheimer's and Parkinson's disease, which he bravely battled for many years. He was married to his devoted wife Olga of 64 years, after meeting and playing music in USO shows together. After briefly serving our country in the US Army, Armand pursued his passion as a jazz musician, drum instructor, and writer in Philadelphia and South Jersey for over 50 years. He was admired and respected as a mentor to students from across the country, many of whom still attribute their success not only to his drum instruction, but his deep and thoughtful life teachings. He was born and raised in South Philadelphia and moved to Glendora, NJ in 1962, where the family lived until 1979. The family moved to the Atlantic City area where Armand continued his music career and teaching as long as he was able. He is predeceased by his parents Giacomo and Adeline Santarelli, and his sister Eileen Santarelli of Philadelphia, and has one surviving brother, Oswald. He will be sadly missed by his loving wife Olga (Egizi), three daughters Elisa Keaveney of Flower Mound, Texas, Gina White of Absecon, and Leticia Santarelli of Egg Harbor Township, and three sons Armand Santarelli, Jr., Jack Santarelli, and Joseph Santarelli, all from the Dallas, Texas area. Along with the loving spouses of his children, Armand proudly has 11 grandchildren and 2 great grandchildren.
